

Council Activity Segments For Cub Scouts

Central Emblem: The circular council or district patch is worn centered on the right uniform pocket (in the temporary patch position). Segments are sewn around this emblem. Segments are for youth participants.

Please be aware that the segment program is a local council program not a BSA National program.



Civic Service—for participating in service project EXCEPT Goodwill Good Turn and Scouting for Food

Recruiter (Hi) Segment—for any Cub Scout responsible for bringing a new Cub Scout into the program



Conservation—for successfully completing unit-approved conservation activities

Scoutcapades—for participating in the annual Scoutcapades event



Tiger Cub—for successfully completing the 1st grade as a Tiger Cub

Webelos Camporee—for any Webelos participating in a district camporee with a Webelos program



Bike Rodeo—participating in a pack or district sponsored bike rodeo. The Council has information packet.

Tree Plant—for participating in the council-sponsored tree plant activity



Day Camp—for attending a week-long day camp experience

Scouting for Food—for participating in the council annual Scouting for Food drive



Boys' Life—for any Cub Scout whose pack is 100% Boys' Life (one subscription per family)

Webelos Campout—for participating in a den or pack-organized parent / son Webelos campout



Rain gutter Regatta—for all who build and race a boat in a pack-organized rain gutter regatta

Goodwill Good Turn—for participating with the pack in the annual council Goodwill Good Turn activity



Anniversary—for participating in a pack-organized activity that displays Scouting to the public during the anniversary each February

Helping—Seeing—for Webelos who participate in a special activity with a local Boy Scout troop



Learn to Swim—for successfully completing a pack learn to swim program

Space Derby—for building and racing a space derby rocket in a pack-organized event



National Summertime Pack Award—for all whose pack has met the requirements (see charter packet)

Resident Camp—for attending the resident camp experience



Physical Fitness (Cub Scout Olympics) - for participating in a pack-organized Olympics using the national guidelines on the 5 required events

Kite Derby—for building and participating in a den or pack-sponsored kite derby



Pinewood Derby—for building and racing a car in a pack-organized pinewood derby event

Unit Activity—for a special den or pack activity approved by the pack and not covered another segment



Council Activity Segments—For Cub Scouts

BSA Tour Permits should be used for every traveled event.

Trips & Outings require at least 2 registered adult leaders—one must be at least 21 years of age or older

Overnight camping by 2nd and 3rd grade Cub dens / packs is only approved at Cub World at Scouters' Mountain.

Zoo Fun—for 2nd & 3rd grade Scouts visiting the Oregon Zoo in Portland

Fort Clatsop—2nd year Webelos visit the museum / headquarters and tour the fort. Hike at least 2 miles of the Lewis & Clark Historic Trail



OMSI Search—for 2nd & 3rd grade Scouts visiting the Oregon Museum of Science & Industry in Portland

Hiking I—for beginning hikers. Short non-demanding hikes. For Wolves & Bears



Winter Activity—for taking part in a wintertime activity such as innertubing, skating, or sledding

Hiking II—more difficult, challenging hikes. More appropriate for Webelos



Fort Vancouver—for 2nd & 3rd grade Scouts visiting the Fort Vancouver Museum and touring the historic fort

Art & Music Appreciation—to introduce Scouts to the arts & music. Visit a county fair, Artquake, theater, etc.



Barlow Trail—for 3rd grade & older Scouts—hike at least 2 miles of the Old Barlow Trail—near Hwy 26, Govt Camp

Northwest History—experience the history of our great Northwest. Museums to historic houses to ferry rides.



Ape Caves—for 3rd grade & older Scouts hike the north loop (the north tube is off limits). Read or listen to the story of the Ape Caves

Science & Nature Weekend—a trip to discover our world. From wildlife refuges, a park, hatchery, recycling center, etc.



Magness Tree Farm—for 3rd grade & older Scouts visit and tour the Tree Farm

Living Service—adopt a shut-in, visit a nursing home, brighten someone's life



Multnomah Falls—for 3rd grade & older Scouts hike the loop trail from Wahkeena Falls to Lookout Point (2 miles). Visit Multnomah Falls

Patriotic Service—place flags in cemeteries, carry flags, and/or participate in a public parade



Wahle Watch—2nd year Webelos view a tape-show of whale watching at any of the coast State Parks. Watch for whales.

Silver Creek Falls—2nd year Webelos camp at the State Park's cabins or tent sites. Hike at least 1 of the loop trails to the falls. Visit the museum



Youth Protection—for all youth who view *It Happened to Me* as part of the pack youth protection training



Butte Creek Horse Trip—2nd year Webelos visit Butte Creek and participate in the orientation. Take a horse ride of at least 2 hours (arrange through the council office)
